Health of the Jordan Still Looking Good

he Jordan River continues to score generally excellent grades on the quality of its waters, according to results released this spring by the Great Lakes Environmental Center [GLEC].

The Friends of the Jordan River Watershed retained GLEC in 2017 to test five study sites along the Jordan, which include Deer Creek, Bennett Creek, Green River, and downstream and upstream of the

federal Jordan River Fish Hatchery. GLEC staff conducted macroinvertebrate, habitat and algal assessments at each of the sites following Michigan Department of Environmental Quality's [MDEQ] Procedure 51, which describes qualitative biological and habitat survey protocols for wadeable streams.

"All five study sites rated as Acceptable when assessing the macroinvertebrate community and Excellent when assessing the habitat," the GLEC report concluded. "Deer Creek scored slightly lower during the macroinvertebrate assessment than the other four sites most likely due to the absence of stoneflies at this location and the dominance of one taxa (the mayfly

Baetidae). The high percentage of sandy substrate and low percentage of coarser substrates such as gravel and cobble would inhibit the colonization of stoneflies. Bennett Creek, the Green River and the Jordan River consisted of a mix of sand, gravel, and cobble, and as a result supported multiple families of mayflies, stoneflies, and caddisflies at each site. The algal community assessment

identified two species present in high proportions at all sites as well as multiple other species contributing to the unique community composition at each site."

The study was designed to establish baseline data and trend analysis at the five sites in order to observe and document any significant changes in the water quality of the Jordan River, according to FOJ President Dave Peterson, who thanks all who have donated to the FOJ to make the assessment possible.

Rebecca Drenth Named 2018 Recipient of Dr. John Richter Memorial Scholarship

Rebecca Drenth, a 2018 graduate from East Jordan High School, has been named the 2018 recipient of the Dr. John Richter Memorial Scholarship, given each spring by the Friends of the Jordan River Watershed in honor of the late founding member and president of the FOJ for many years.

The \$1000 scholarship is awarded annually to a graduating senior from a school in the Lake Charlevoix watershed, who will be pursuing college study of environmental issues.

Rebecca will be attending Michigan State University in the fall, where she will study fisheries and wildlife and water sciences. She is the daughter of Tim and Kathy Drenth. Her passion for the environment was fueled when she volunteered to help in Appalachia.

"It was in Clay County, Kentucky, the poorest county in the United States, working with other volunteers to restore and remodel unsafe and unhealthy homes, that I witnessed first hand how the health of an environment is intricately connected to the health of its people," Rebecca wrote in her application. "The noticeable lack of public sanitation (garbage disposal, sewer systems, access to fresh water in homes) left the environment littered with trash, the rivers filled with raw sewage

ore than 100 community volunteers and area AmeriCorps workers joined together Saturday, May 19 in East Jordan as part of Northern Michigan's Russ Mawby Signature Service Project, "Enhance East Jordan."

The community-minded group took on a number of beautification efforts throughout the East Jordan area, among them the nature walk behind the Friends of the Jordan River's Watershed Center. Other sites included Sportsman's Park, Raven Hill Discovery Center, East Jordan Public Schools/Community Trail, Jordan River Fish Hatchery, and Grandvue Medical Care Facility.

"This was a very special opportunity to dig into one of Northern Michigan's most picturesque communities, and see some of its most beautiful and important assets up close," said Alison Mellon, director of Char-Em ISD's AmeriCorps program. State of the Jordan River Fishery

he Jordan River is in fine shape, but in regards to conservation and fisheries, the work is never done. The river seems to be in good shape as the 2018 season starts out. The river does seem to show an increase in small to mid-size fish, most likely due to the increase in baseline flows over the last few years increasing access to important nursery habitat near the shoreline.

However, personal observation has continued to show brook trout populations being pushed further and further into the upper reaches and tributaries, and an increased abundance of young-of-year coho salmon throughout the system — a correlation that should not be overlooked due to the known detriment coho salmon smolts cause to brook trout populations.

Recent work completed by the Great Lakes Environmental Center focusing on water quality continues to prove the Jordan River is the epitome of a northern Michigan coldwater stream. Water quality remains in good to excellent categories, and macroinvertebrate counts continue to exceed Michigan standards. Friends of the Jordan plans to continue this important work in the future to continue to build baseline data in the event of any problems down the road.

This spring, the Friends of the Jordan River Watershed added a committee/segment to our board meetings — "fisheries" — in which I report any updates in regards to fisheries, and advise the board on anything relating to such. I've continued to work with our local biologist on behalf of Friends of the Jordan to continue to see what changes and improvements may be made to the Jordan River. Our primary focus is habitat improvements where needed, working with Conservation Resource Alliance on identifying these





needs and how to complete them.

The Jordan River has long been known for its brook trout population, being known as one of the only lower peninsula systems to have wild and native brook trout populations prior to the stocking era of the late 1800s.

Therefore, Friends of the Jordan recently passed a resolution placing an emphasis on protecting and rehabilitating the brook trout populations throughout the Jordan River watershed. The focus of the resolution is stressing the importance of brook

trout over non-native fish, in particular adfluvial pacific salmonids, by way of mechanical means and fishing regulation changes.

The resolution is a statement showing that Friends of the Jordan continues to be at the forefront of conservation efforts in Michigan, especially as it relates to native fisheries and our coldwater resources.

I am proud to say I am a board member of Friends of the Jordan, and I look forward to continued improvement of the fisheries within the Jordan River watershed. A conservationist's job is never done, and I for one, still have a lot left to give.

The continuing battle against sea lampreys will move to the Jordan River in June. A U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service assessment crew will conduct work in the Jordan River (Charlevoix County) on or about June 12 – 21 to estimate the abundance of sea lampreys. The information gathered will be used to determine the need for sea lamprey control.

JRAG, Lions Ready for the Season

Collection totes for returnable cans and bottles and trash are now out for the season at the Jordan River access sites, which include Rogers, Webster, Old State and Graves Crossing roads, according to Tom Breakey, president of the Jordan River Action Group. Look for their familiar red, river collection bags at the landings along the river.

Breakey said once again the East Jordan Lions/Lioness Club will serve as caretakers of the sites. More than 8,000 returnables and more than 100 bags of trash were recovered by the group last year. "Our efforts have cut down on the amount of trash in the river," Breakey

added, "There are a couple of other groups who are planning a Jordan River cleanup this summer too. Hats off to them."

The group now has an "I SUPPORT JRAG" sticker for a \$20 donation, available by mail through Jordan River Action Group, PO Box 215, East Jordan, MI 49727. They also hope to have booths at this year's Freedom Festival Block Party on Main Street in East Jordan and at Paddle Antrim in Ellsworth.

after the rains, and wells for drinking water polluted with the runoff from abandoned mines. I was shocked that this was *my* America."

Returning home to East Jordan, she immersed herself in learning about fresh water and environmental sustainability through opportunities offered by Tip of Mitt Watershed, Inland Seas Waterways Assocation, and Michigan's Department of Environmental Quality.

"I realize I have taken much for granted living in a state that values programs that keep our land, waterways, and wildlife healthy," Rebecca added. "I am passionate to learn as much as I can, especially about water quality and its impact on our environment, so I can help people, like the ones in Clay County, live healthier lives and have hope for a better future."

Before starting college this fall, Rebecca will work this summer, as she did last, as Beach Water Testing Coordinator for the Health Department of Northwest Michigan, where she has learned the importance of keeping our water clean.

"The FOJ scholarship provides me with the support necessary to further my education in environmental science," Rebecca added. "I'm excited to partner with the Friends of the Jordan to learn and apply all I can to help our community protect the quality of our water. Thank you for believing and investing in my education!"
